# Celebrating our learning...

## <u>Class 1</u>

In Literacy we have been sequencing the story of the Three Little Pigs and in Wild Tribe we had fun creating our own little pigs.



#### <u>Class 2</u>

This week has flown by in Class 2. Our writing unit has kicked off with a Cornish myth about a beautiful fairy, Tamara. She was so sad that she cried herself into a river which became the River Tamar. We have been using some fantastic descriptive language throughout the week. In maths, we have been using lots of new resources to represent 2 and 3 digit numbers. We got our hands on the ukuleles with Mrs Butlin this week and we're starting to play particular notes to create some simple songs. # <u>Class 3</u>

In class 3 we have continued to read and be inspired by Kensuke's Kingdom, using it to write some descriptive passages. In Maths we have been practicing rounding and have produced some excellent posters to help us remember the procedure. We learned all about hemispheres in geography and compared artistic styles across different cultures in art. We have also enjoyed conducting experiments in science to construct efficient circuits and determine which material would be best for a lunch-box.







As part of our safeguarding responsibilities, we are currently working with the NSPCC on their Speak Out, Stay Safe programme for children. It helps children understand:

 $\Rightarrow$   $% \left( Abuse \right)$  Abuse in all its forms and how to recognise the signs of abuse

 $\Rightarrow$  That abuse is never a child's fault and they have the right to be safe

 $\Rightarrow$   $\;$  Where to get help and the sources of help available to them, including the <u>Childline Service</u>

All of the children watched an online assembly this week which gave them an overview of the forms of abuse, it also focussed on the trusted adults they can turn to for help and how to access Childline. Next week this will continue to be the focus of our PSHE lessons, also the Year 2 and Year 5/6 children will have a session with the team from the NSPCC who are visiting the school on Thursday.



Taking holidays in term time will have a significant impact on a child's learning, as a school we expect parents to help the school by not taking their child out of school during term time. As a Headteacher I am not able to be authorise holiday requests and they will be classed as an unauthorised absence in line with national guidelines and could potentially incur a penalty notice. It is vital that

your child is in school, regular attendance is important to ensure the best possible learning outcomes for all children, every lesson counts.

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the school may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a Cornwall Council Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices 8 August 2021 Information Classification: CONTROLLED custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court.

\* spare clothes and shoes/wellies that you don't mind getting dirty \*


#### <u>Defibrillator (in a box)</u>
